POST-OP CARE FOR CROWN AND BRIDGE

The temporary crown that you are wearing serves several purposes other than appearance. It protects the underlying tooth structure and gum. It also reduces the possibility of movement of your tooth. For these reasons, it is extremely important that you continue to wear the “temporary” until the new crown can be cemented. If it should come off before this time, we recommend that you slip the temporary back on the tooth and contact our office for a recementation appointment. If for some reason an office visit is impossible, a little denture adhesive or dent temp (from the drug store) or Vaseline may be placed in the temporary to add retention. A new crown may not fit properly on a tooth that has been without its temporary for several days. We recommend avoiding sticky foods (gum, candy, etc.), as they tend to remove temporaries. We also recommend “careful” flossing (pulling the floss out sideways when finished) so you will not dislodge the temporary.

Care of the gum is extremely important while the temporary is on the tooth. Light brushing once or twice a day is recommended and okay. Heavy scrubbing can damage the gum and cause irreversible recession. Remember, light brushing only. Warm salt water rinses will aid in returning the gum to its healthy appearance. It is normal for the gum to be slightly irritated after the first crown appointment. Lots of warm salt water rinses aid in gum healing. Other normal symptoms can be a little sensitivity and soreness. If necessary, Tylenol or a similar drug will usually handle the discomfort.

Your next visit will be to receive your “new crown”. Generally, the patients find this to be a shorter and easier appointment. Most patients do not require anesthesia for a second appointment. However, there will be some sensitivity while we adjust, cement, and clean around the crown. We will be happy to numb your tooth and gum if needed. It is important to us that you are comfortable. 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POST-OP CARE FOR PORCELAIN VENEERS

You have just had some teeth prepared for porcelain veneers. The teeth have received plastic temporary restorations to cover the prepared tooth structure while the new veneers are made. The following information will help you to understand the procedure:

1. Temporary veneers do not resemble the final restorations in any way.
2. Temporary veneers are attached only slightly to the underlying teeth so they can be removed easily. Be careful to chew only on teeth without temporary veneers on them.
3. If a temporary veneer comes off, call us and we will replace it immediately. If you are in a situation that will not allow you to come in, try using some denture adhesive such as Fixodent, but you still need to see us as soon as possible
4. Prepared teeth may be sensitive to hot, cold, and sweets. When the final restorations are placed, the teeth will not have these sensations.
5. Your gums will be slightly irritated for a few days. Avoid heavy brushing of the temporary veneers. You may floss, but remember to pull the floss through.
6. Your final porcelain veneers will be as close to the beauty and function of natural teeth as possible. It usually takes 8-10 days for the lab to have them ready and delivered to us.
